2022 cost of living adjustment

To offset increases in the cost of living, Bell's pension payments are adjusted according to an indexation formula. The indexation rate applied to Bell pensions as of January 1, 2022 is 2% for retirees under age 65 and 2.82% from age 65.

For those who retired during 2021, the indexation rate is prorated to the number of months since their retirement date.

Certification of pension entitlement

As part of BCE's good governance practices, a select group of pensioners are asked to complete a certificate of pension entitlement each year to ensure payments are collected by the intended recipients.

Our next audit is taking place in the spring. Selected pensioners will receive a form to complete and send back as soon as possible. Furthermore, the online tool for the pension audit will be available on the Benefits site (bell.ca/mybenefits) for audited pensioners who want to submit their forms online.



Submit your benefits claims online

Bell retirees can go paperless and use Manulife's secure online claims process, making benefits reimbursements faster and easier. If you're not already submitting claims online, the first time you access the site you'll be prompted to provide your email address and banking information.

You may be asked to attach a photo of your receipt when submitting your claim. Once your account is set up, notifications will be sent by email and your claim will be paid directly into your bank account within 1 to 5 business days. To submit your claim online, log into the Manulife Plan Member Website at www.manulife.ca/signin.



Dousing flames in retirement

Manitoba retiree volunteers with fire department, community initiative

Les Griffin spent 38 years supporting maintenance, installation, upgrades and planning for DMS, Centrex and other digital enhancements until he retired in 2014. He was at the grass roots of digitization in Manitoba supporting the first DMS 100 and cellular switches.

"In the late 80's, early 90's, we had 4 cell sites in Winnipeg and if you stepped out of a building and walked around the corner you lost reception," Les explained. "But we still thought that was pretty amazing."

When MTS purchased Allstream, he joined a team that supported and planned DMS switches and software all across Canada.

Fighting Fires

In retirement, Les has continued his passion for being part of a team that makes a bigger difference for his community – whether at his cottage in the Northwestern Ontario community of Ingolf or his hometown of Winnipeg.

When the community of Ingolf built a new fire hall in 2011, Les and his brother Brian had already volunteered to be part of the 15-person volunteer crew that dedicates every second summer weekend to training, testing pumps and fire hoses and completing courses to keep the department running smoothly.

"By the time a crew comes from Kenora or further away we felt it could be disastrous. So we developed a fire team," says Les, noting that many cottages in the area can only be accessed by water.

While Mines and Natural Resources put out large forest fires in the region, his crew is there to handle minor fires and lightning strikes – often snuffing out flames before they can cause serious damage.

"On a few occasions." Les noted.
"Mines and Natural Resources
detected some smoke, but by
the time they arrived we already
had everything under control."

Koats for Kids

When Les and his wife Maureen, also a Bell MTS retiree who worked in Human Resources, Marketing and Project Management, settle back into Manitoba each fall they join other Bell retirees delivering winter clothes to

kids in need through the United Way Koats for Kids program.

They take a van supplied by Bell MTS to pick-up winter hats, coats, boots and other clothes from donation locations; drop them off for cleaning before taking them to schools and community centres to distribute.

"It's quite the thing. The biggest pleasure. They are so happy to see you. Come on in. Thank you. thank you," says Les. "It's November and we're told kids are starting to say how cold they are and that they don't have a jacket. It really makes us understand that we live a life of privilege."

Pink Ribbon Classic

Through his contacts with Koats for Kids, Les was asked for the first time last year to volunteer for a woman's fundraising golf tournament in support of cancer research called the Pink Ribbon Classic.

"We go with each group of 4 and find golf balls, keep scores etc.," says Les "The group I had were 4 cancer survivors, they could care less about golf scores. They were there to have fun and that's what they did."

It was an experience Les truly enjoyed and he can't wait to be part of the Pink Ribbon Golf Classic again next year.



In addition to being a volunteer firefighter, Les also volunteers with the Pink Ribbon Classic golf tournament and Koats for Kids.




Discover vintage Bell print ads from the 1920s

This collection of vintage Bell print advertisements covers the 1920s and highlights the many advancements in communications technology after the First World War, including the growing use of long distance service.


In 1921, Bell launched an ad campaign highlighting the convenience of extension telephones – additional phones wired to the single telephone line in a home.



The first long distance campaigns were focused on residential customers, but Bell quickly developed marketing campaigns focused on business customers in industries like agriculture, fisheries and manufacturing.



Bell introduced dial service in Toronto in 1924 and in Montréal in 1925, an innovation that replaced the verbal instructions callers gave to a telephone operator. Bell launched receiver-transmitter sets in 1927, ushering in a new era of combination handset telephones.
