 Donate or volunteer: Both ways of giving matter and help improve lives. When you track your volunteer hours in the Giving portal (bell.benevity.org), you can earn points, qualify for team grants and a chance to win some great rewards. If you need a login name and password to access the portal, please email giving@bell.ca for assistance or call the Giving Program team at 1-866-670-8800.

• Donate through payroll deductions or your credit card: If you already donate with deductions from your pension payments, your donations will automatically renew for 2023 unless you contact the Giving Program team at giving@bell.ca or make a change directly in the Giving portal. Your tax credits will be included on your income tax slips. If you donate by credit card, you can download a tax receipt from the Giving portal.

Kudos to Bell volunteers

Bell team members and retirees who have registered through the Giving portal have recorded 60,000 volunteer hours, received 1,277 recognition badges and achieved \$14,000 in charitable reward dollars. Bell team volunteer grants have also supported hundreds of organizations with \$200,000 in funding.

If you volunteer, remember to track your volunteer hours in the <u>Giving portal</u> to receive reward dollars that you can give to your charity of choice. Volunteer teams of 3 or more employees and/or retirees who have volunteered 30 combined hours for the same activity or organization are eligible to apply.

Bell celebrates multicultural events and communities



Bell continues to focus on our multicultural consumer base by participating in events that celebrate diverse communities.

Over the summer and early fall, Bell was a platinum sponsor of the <u>International Film Festival of</u> South Asia (IFFSA) with Bell leaders participating in the event including remarks by Payal Gabrani-Bahl, SVP, Household Marketing and an appearance by Claire Gillies, EVP, Marketing and President Consumer, who joined actors and IFFSA founder Sunny Gill at the opening night festivities. 

PCMag: Bell once again has Canada's fastest mobile network

Bell's wireless network was awarded fastest in Canada for the third year in a row in PCMag's 2022 Fastest Mobile Networks Canada report, the annual study of mobile network performance across the country. The report covers 31 cities and rural areas to test the network speed and coverage of Canada's major wireless brands. Bell's 5G network scored fastest in 22 of the 31 areas tested. 

Create a secure new Manulife ID

As of November 25, you will be required to create a new Manulife ID in order to access Manulife's plan member website. If you have not already done so, you will need to follow these simple steps to create your new Manulife ID. This is a new, secure way for you to sign in to view your account and other information.

In order to set-up your Manulife ID, you will need your plan contract number (0303030) and your member certificate number (your Personal Employee Identification Number). You will be prompted to create a new username and password.

Your new Manulife ID will provide additional security with 2-step verification, which helps Manulife keep your important plan information safe and secure. It will also make it easy to update or change your password in the future.

Submit your benefits claims online

For enhanced speed and convenience, all claims can be submitted online through the Manulife plan member website at www.manulife.ca/signin. Once your account is set up, notifications will be sent by email and your claim will be paid directly into your bank account within 1 to 5 business days.

Plan B monthly health care premiums to increase January 1

If you are currently paying for Bell's Plan B health care program for your dependents, please note that the monthly premium will increase by \$1.75 to \$45.50, effective January 1, 2023.

The next premium review will take place January 1, 2024. Any required changes will be noted on your annual pension and benefits retiree statement.

Your taxable benefits and pension income will be adjusted accordingly.

Staying connected after working at Bell

Retiree gives his time and talent to help communities.

In November 1963, Yves Rainville began what was to become a long and remarkable 31-year career at Bell. Having left the family farm in Lanaudière, he accepted a job in Bell's equipment department, where he worked day and night to ensure deliveries were made to central offices and garages in Montréal.

Self-taught, as well as meticulous and efficient, Yves became a repair technician on the teletypewriter team, a position he held until his retirement in 1994. His talent and skills were so appreciated and sought after that his colleagues often called on the "French Guy" for repairs. This led him to travel from Gander to the LG-2 power plant in James Bay where he repaired teletypewriters in airplanes.

Devices for the hard of hearing

With the expertise he acquired, Yves began volunteering by setting up teletypewriters for the deaf and hard of hearing.

At the time, Yves had to go to the Longue-Pointe military base (now Hochelaga-Maisonneuve) to pick up devices donated by the Canadian army. He adjusted and adapted the devices so that people could communicate through writing. The devices were then given to the Sisters of Providence who were responsible for distribution.

Devoted soccer coach

Yves also got involved in his children's soccer league as a coach. Determined to preserve the league, which was on the verge of bankruptcy, he took on the roles of Director, Treasurer, Secretary, Vice-president and President of the organization, which eventually became Soccer Québec thanks to his tenacity and energy. Yves continued his involvement by becoming president of the Moustique provincial tournament. He also organized 'soccer-o-thons' and outings to bring young people to see Montréal Impact games.

Once his children grew up, Yves used his handyman skills to help his grandchildren by teaching DIY workshops with his spouse. Every month, they went to their grandson's 1st grade class to work on projects with students, giving their time over the course of the entire school year for six years.

A man of heart

Since 2012, Yves has been a volunteer at the RCM L'Assomption Volunteer Centre located in Repentigny. He transports patients who have to go to the hospital for dialysis treatment. He bought a new car just to do his volunteer work – which now has 162,000 km on the odometer, a number that continues to increase. Yves transports patients five or six days a week, devoting about 130 hours every month.

To highlight his remarkable commitment and dedication to serving others and the community, Yves was awarded the title "Man of Heart". It's a recognition he is proud of and shares with his colleagues.

Celebrating the life of former Bell CEO Jean de Grandpré



Bell team members and retirees are mourning the loss of former chief executive Jean de Grandpré, who passed away on July 31 at the age of 100. Renowned for his mentorship of future Bell leaders, Mr. de Grandpré often said "It is the people that make the company."

Born in Montréal in 1921, Mr. de Grandpré joined Bell in 1966 as General Counsel and held progressively senior leadership roles at the company before being named CEO and Chair of the Board in 1976. Mr. de Grandpré was instrumental in the creation of Bell Canada Enterprises (BCE) in 1983 and helped guide our company through a transformative period in the Canadian telecom industry that included the launch of mobile phone services, the introduction of fibre optics technology and the rise of personal computers.

A Companion of the Order of Canada and Chancellor Emeritus of McGill University, Mr. de Grandpré published his biography, <u>L'héritage d'un géant</u>, in 2019.

Explore vintage Bell print ads from the 1930s

The latest <u>BCE.ca</u> collection of vintage Bell print advertisements covers the 1930s, highlighting how our team was supporting Canadians in the midst of the Great Depression while delivering the era's most advanced communications technology – including cross-country and international long distance service.

Ads from the period showcase the ease and cost effectiveness of using Bell telephone service to connect with family and friends – while also offering high-tech bragging rights for the kids. Others encouraged working young people to do their part and "cheerfully chip-in to pay for the telephone" – which had quickly become "a social necessity" for youngsters.



In 1931, a new "all-Canadian Telephone Line" seamlessly connected customers from Halifax to Vancouver for the first time. Conference calling was launched soon after, with Bell ads encouraging families who were unable to meet in person to schedule a time to catch up by telephone. "Mother" very much appreciated how the new service kept the family connected!



In 1933, Bell's Publicity Department launched an innovative new campaign that used plasticine depictions of our customers along with humorous text like "When relatives arrive... and your husband is out of town... and you can't stand the strain all by yourself... Get him on Long Distance."
