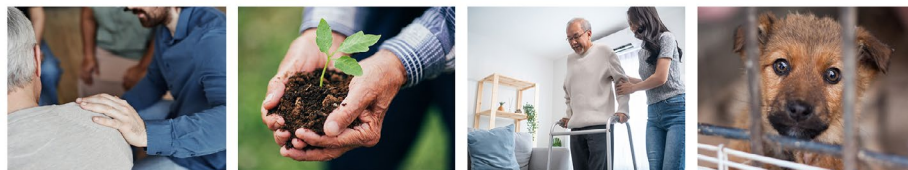

- **Donate through payroll deductions or your credit card:** If you already donate with deductions from your pension payments, your donations will automatically renew for 2024 unless you contact the Giving Program team at giving@bell.ca or make a change directly in the [Giving portal](#). Your tax credits will be included on your income tax slips. If you donate by credit card, you can download a tax receipt from the Giving portal.

Kudos to Bell volunteers

This year, Bell team members and retirees who registered through the Giving portal have recorded 76,000 volunteer hours, and have been awarded over \$73,000 in charitable reward dollars. Furthermore, we have seen a 62% increase in the number of volunteers and a 16% increase in Bell team grants awarded this year.

If you volunteer, remember to track your volunteer hours in the [Giving portal](#) to receive reward dollars that you can give to your charity of choice. Volunteer teams of 3 or more employees and/or retirees who have volunteered 30 combined hours for the same activity or organization are eligible to apply.

Plan B monthly health care premiums to increase January 1

If you are currently paying for Bell's Plan B health care program for your dependents, please note that the monthly premium will increase by \$2.00 to \$47.50 (plus sales tax where applicable), effective January 1, 2024.

The next premium review will take place January 1, 2025. Any required changes will be noted on your annual pension and benefits retiree statement.

Your taxable benefits and pension income will be adjusted accordingly.

Helping keep costs down

Prescription drugs represent the largest costs to the health plan. You can help keep costs down and minimize future premium increases by discussing the lowest-cost treatment options with your medical practitioner and pharmacist.

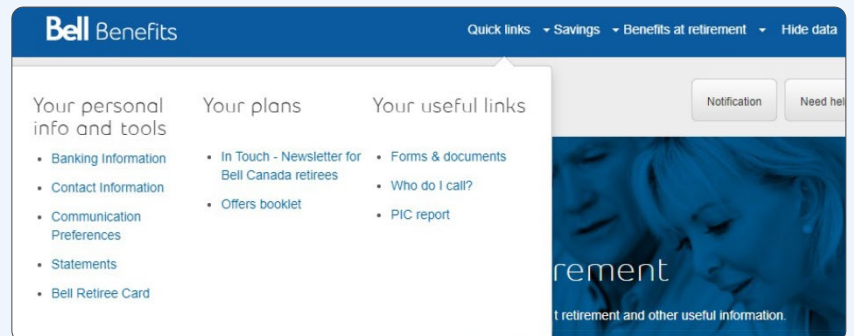

To ensure pension benefits are reaching the right people, each year in May, Bell asks a sample of retirees to validate their personal information by completing an annual pension audit.

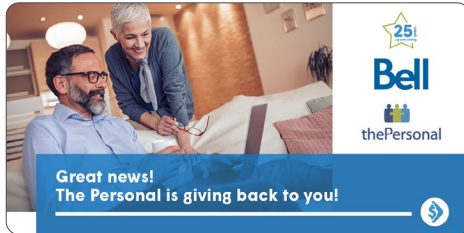

Building the future

A life-changing and rewarding experience for Louis Krushisky

Louis Krushnisky, a retired Bell team member with nearly 40 years of service, embarked on a new chapter in his life by embracing volunteerism with Habitat for Humanity GTA in February 2019. An analytical thinker, Louis studied engineering at Carleton University in Ottawa while juggling a part-time job as a Directory Assistance Operator at 411. A role that involved using physical phone books, a far cry from today's digital, self-serve tools. Following graduation, he moved to Toronto, where he worked as a Systems Engineer, then as a Programmer. Married with two children, his career and family responsibilities left little room for volunteerism at the time.

Post-work activities

Louis retired in 2018, a major change in his life led him to reflect on his future. He associated volunteering with fundraising, which he was not as interested in. On the other hand, staying at home 24/7 was not very appealing. His wife suggested he explore the possibilities offered by ReStore, Habitat for Humanity's resale store.

Joining Habitat as a volunteer proved to be a remarkable decision. The volunteer team assigned him to the former Etobicoke ReStore in February 2019. Louis interacted



with customers, moved furniture, made minor repairs and other related tasks. His proactive work ethic and desire to help aligned perfectly with the organization's values.

Further volunteerism and growth

In April 2019, Louis joined the 'deconstruction' team, a role that put him in touch with homeowners who donate materials. He worked alongside a dedicated team to remove items such as kitchens, stone countertops, vanities and, on occasion, the entire contents of a home, all without causing damage.

Louis also became a volunteer member of the health and safety committee, participating in monthly safety inspections. As well as raising his safety awareness, the role enabled him to meet some remarkable people in the community.

The COVID-19 pandemic slowed volunteer operations for many organizations and individuals. When things started to open up again, Louis returned to work at ReStore until the opportunity arose to become team leader on a new construction project. This new role took him out of his comfort zone and he enjoyed the challenge, as well as seeing the enthusiasm of individuals collaborating on construction projects.

Louis' journey from retired telecommunications employee to dedicated Habitat for Humanity volunteer illustrates the transformative power of giving back to the community.

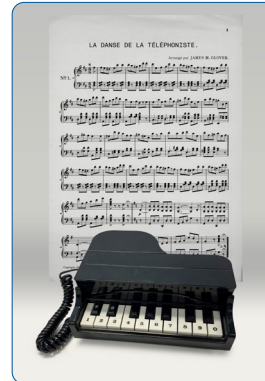

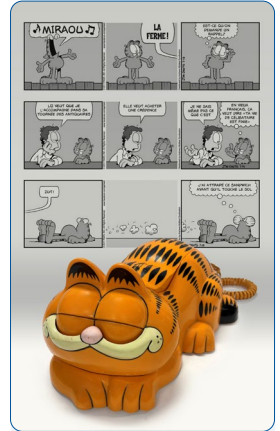

This whimsical phone features a receiver shaped like Mickey's famous ears.



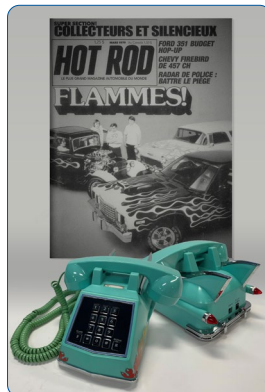
Play the keys and talk simultaneously on this very chic phone from the 1980s!

The Bell Hockey Classic is back this year, bringing together hockey lovers from coast to coast for an unforgettable event on April 5 and 6.

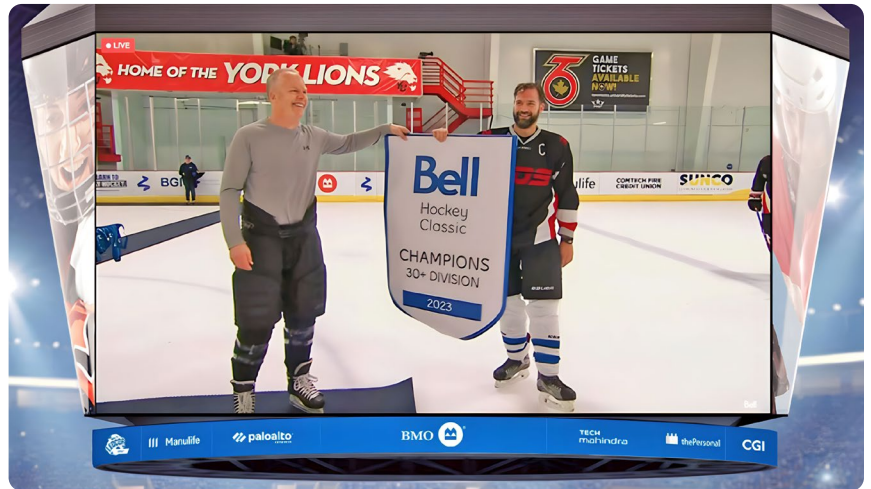
The tournament has a rich history dating back to 1903, when Bell team members first competed in what was then known as the President's Hockey Tournament against Northern Electric.
