January 25 is Bell Let's Talk Day and this year, Bell is committing an additional \$10 million towards our goal of \$155 million in funding for Canadian mental health programs, replacing the 5 cents per interaction donations made in previous years.

Exceeding any previous Bell Let's Talk Day donation, this funding will help support vitally important mental health projects all year round and allow us to put more emphasis on the practical ways we can all make positive change on Bell Let's Talk Day and throughout the year.

To drive home this message, we are highlighting the challenges faced by Canadians living with mental health and addiction issues and sharing a collective call to action – let's change this.

Let's change this asks everyone to play a role in fostering better mental health in this country, and offers practical ways to create change in our homes, schools, workplaces and communities:

- Choose a mental health organization to learn about or support
- Help a friend struggling with their mental health by learning how to support them
- Ask about how your school, workplace or community is creating change for mental health



- Nurture your own well-being by practicing and learning mental health strategies
- Get involved in a mental health initiative or organize an event to support mental health
- Engage in conversations about mental health to fight stigma

Bell's long-term commitment to mental health

Working collaboratively and with purpose, Bell invests in hundreds of organizations across the country to increase access to mental health supports and services and help create change. With the additional \$10 million announced, we have committed more than \$139 million towards our \$155 million goal. Our 2023 initiatives include:

- The Bell Let's Talk Community
 Fund, an annual program that
 provides grants up to \$25,000
 for local and grassroots mental
 health initiatives
- The <u>Bell Let's Talk Diversity Fund</u>, which supports the mental health and well-being of BIPOC communities across Canada
- The <u>Bell Let's Talk Post-</u>
 <u>Secondary Fund</u> that supports
 student mental health programs
- New funding for other mental health projects
- Bell also supports employees and their eligible family members with workplace programs, including unlimited mental health benefits coverage



Bell Let's Talk in your community

The Bell Let's Talk Community Fund provides annual donations of up to \$25,000 to charitable organizations increasing access to mental health services and supports in communities across the country.

The Bell Let's Talk Diversity Fund supports organizations aiming to reduce the stigma around mental illness and or/increase access to culturally informed mental health and well-being support for the Black, Indigenous, and People of Colour communities in Canada.

Meet some of the organizations that have received grants from Bell Let's Talk!



In partnership with the Bell Let's Talk Diversity Fund over 5 years, Kitikmeot Heritage Society, in Nunavut, will connect Inuinnait leaders and Elders with mental health experts, building pathways to healing that go hand-in-hand with language and culture revitalization. In addition to running the May Hakongak Community Library & Cultural Centre, the organization offers daily programming to help community members reconnect with their identities.



With support from the Bell Let's Talk Community Fund, the Burin Peninsula Health Care Foundation, in Newfoundland and Labrador, helped two local schools create therapeutic spaces – called Comfort Coves – for their students. The funding also provided video conferencing to connect students directly to services offered by Eastern Health's walk-in clinic (Mental Health and Addictions Program).

The Canadian Mental Health Association, in Edmonton, Alberta, works within the community to support people experiencing mental illness through education, training and more. With their Bell Let's Talk Community Fund grant, CMHA Edmonton has launched the Multicultural Seniors Outreach program, supporting nearly 100 seniors from Romanian, Bhutanese, Karen-speaking, Somali and South Sudanese communities.

With their Bell Let's Talk Community Fund grant, Hong Fook Mental Health Association, in Ontario, is expanding their walk-in and short-term counselling programs. By offering bilingual programming for Asian youth and their parents, Hong Fook is helping bridge gaps in understandings of mental health while strengthening relationships through community programming that integrates cultural practices.

Bell Let's Talk Diversity Fund announces 11 new grant recipients

Bell Let's Talk announced 11 new <u>Diversity Fund</u> recipients who are helping create positive change for members of Black, Indigenous and People of Colour (BIPOC) communities in Canada.

By increasing access to culturally informed mental health and well-being services and reducing the stigma around mental illness, the selected organizations are making meaningful change at a time when communities need it most. With this latest announcement, the Bell Let's Talk Diversity Fund has now provided \$4.45 million in grants to 39 organizations since launching in 2020.

In addition to campus activities, hundreds of student-athletes from sports teams across the country are coming together to support mental health at more than 200 varsity and collegiate games throughout the month of January.




Bell Let's Talk presents a donation of \$100,000 to support the creation of the University of Manitoba Student Wellness Centre.


