There were also multiple announcements to enhance the reach and success of Bell Media advertisers, including partnerships with The Trade Desk, LiveRamp and Magna.



Bell receives fewer CCTS complaints than Telus, Rogers



The Commission for Complaints for Telecomtelevision Services (CCTS) announced a 12% industrywide increase in complaints in its 2024-2025 mid-year report.

Although the report highlights significant industry pressures, Bell's industry share only rose slightly from 16.4% to 16.7% and, for the first time, Bell received fewer complaints than both Telus at 19.7% and Rogers at 18.7%.

When comparing our results per 10,000 subscribers, Bell is now outpacing Rogers and Telus – although we are slightly behind Videotron.

Overall, our BCE group of companies saw our share of industry complaints decrease by 1%.

Identify scams related to government services

The period around tax season brings an increase in scams targeting Canadians. Be aware of fraudulent emails, phone calls, and texts claiming to be from the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA). They may urge you to click a link or reply, often demanding immediate action to receive a tax refund or credit.

The CRA never requests personal information, bank details, or payments via e-transfer, gift cards, or cryptocurrency by text or email. Also, the CRA will never use aggressive language, threaten arrest, or demand immediate payment over the phone.

How to help protect yourself

- If you receive a phone call that sounds suspicious hang up immediately.
- Do not click on any links in suspicious text messages or emails and do not reply to any suspicious text messages or emails.
- If you get a call from an organization that sounds legitimate, but you aren't certain, it's best to hang up. You can then call the organization back to verify the call making sure that you first look up the number for the organization either online or, in the case of a bank or credit card company calling you about your credit or debit card, use the number on the back of your card.

Bell retirees can go paperless and use Manulife's secure online claims process, making benefit reimbursements faster and easier. If you're not already submitting claims online, the first time you access the site you'll be prompted to provide your email address and banking information.

You may be asked to attach a photo of your receipt when submitting your claim.


Once your account is set up, notifications will be sent by email and your claim will be paid directly into your bank account within 1 to 5 business days.

Update on Bell's Pension Plan

The most recent actuarial valuation of the Bell Canada Pension Plan, as at December 31, 2024, showed a funding ratio and a solvency ratio over 115%¹.

This means the plan is sufficiently funded to cover all of its payments on an ongoing basis or if the plan would have been wound down as of December 31, 2024.

In accordance with pension legislation, the surplus position allows for the continuation of the contribution holiday for Bell Canada and its participating subsidiaries.

1. Funding ratio refers to the assets divided by liabilities on a going-concern basis. Solvency ratio refers to assets divided by liabilities as if the Plan had been terminated.

A spur to action

On a summer day in 1994, people woke up to the news that Confederation Life, then Canada's third largest life insurance company, was insolvent. This brought two shocking surprises: first, an apparently robust company could fail, and second, people depending on Confederation for retirement income were at the back of the line in the liquidation.

Bell Pensioners' Group: 30 years of advocacy and support

In the wake of Confederation's collapse, a group of Bell pensioners formed an

organization to advocate for workers and pensioners: The Bell Pensioners' Group (BPG). In 1995, Bell recognized BPG as an advocate for its employees and pensioners, and since then. BPG has worked with Bell to ensure that pension plans remain secure and sustainable.

BPG is a founding member of the Canadian Federation of Pensioners, launched in 2005 to advocate for all Canadian pensioners. The Federation lobbied for Bill C-228, enacted in 2023, which prioritizes pension plan members in a corporate insolvency.

2025 pension audit in progress

As part of good governance and to ensure pensioner records are up-to-date and accurate, Bell conducts annual pension audits. Retirees selected for this process are asked to confirm their personal information. Please note some retirees may receive audit requests in consecutive years.

Reminder letter

Completing the audit is essential for the continued payment of your pension. If you have not yet completed the audit or have misplaced the initial letter, a reminder letter will be sent in July. Please respond promptly using the online Pensioner Audit Tool at bell.ca/mybenefits, by mail or by calling the Benefits Administrator.

If you have not received a letter or email dated April 30, 2025, or a reminder letter in July, it means that you have not been selected for the 2025 pension audit. No action is required on your part.



Honoring Robert McNaughton: five decades of community dedication



In this edition of In Touch we're excited to profile Robert McNaughton, who was awarded the prestigious Winnipeg 150 Medal. Selected from thousands of nominees, Robert is one of only 150 recipients of this honor, which celebrates Winnipeg's 150th anniversary. This remarkable achievement recognizes his nearly five decades of unwavering dedication to the community.

Robert, a long-time MTS employee, embodies the spirit of volunteerism. His philanthropic journey began in 1980 at the Assiniboine Memorial Curling Club, where he coordinated the mixed curling program. He went on to serve on the executive board, including a term as President in the 1990-91 season, while also contributing to the junior curling program from 1988 to 2007. He also participated in various club renovation

projects. Most recently, he chaired the Transportation committee for the 2023 Curling Club Championship.

From 1995 to 2024, Robert served as an active volunteer. board member, and board chair for Computers for Schools, Manitoba Division. This organization provides computers to schools, libraries, non-profit organizations, students, and low-income families throughout Winnipeg and Manitoba. Partnering with the federal government, Computers for Schools also provides technical work experience, preparing individuals under 31 for job placement in various fields.

He served on the MTS Pioneers executive team and was President from 1997 to 1998. Following the sale of MTS to Bell, Robert continued his involvement with Bell MTS Retirees. His leadership in fundraising efforts has supported numerous community programs and

organizations, including inner-city school lunch and activity programs through providing necessary supplies. He has also coordinated MTS retirees in assembling Christmas hampers for the R.B. Russell Christmas Hamper Drive for several years.

Community impact

For nearly five decades, Robert's tireless dedication – assisting, coordinating, initiating, or leading programs and volunteer groups – has enriched the lives of hundreds of children and youth in Winnipeg and the province. His efforts have enabled countless children and youth to participate in sports, learn about computers, enjoy decent meals, engage in safe after-school activities, and have warm coats during cold winter days. His unwavering commitment is an inspiration to us all.
